


2018 Philippine Standard Classification of Crime for Statistical Purposes (PSCCS)

What is the PSCCS?

- hierarchical classification where criminal offenses are allocated into categories that have a certain degree of similarity
- classification of criminal offenses which is based on internationally agreed concepts, definitions and principles in order to enhance the consistency and international comparability of crime statistics, and improve analytic capabilities at both the national and international levels
- patterned after the International Classification of Crime for Statistical Purposes (ICCS, Ver. 1) developed by the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC), and endorsed by the **United Nations Statistical** Commission (UNSC) as the standard international classification for crime statistics in 2015

PSCCS Coding Structure

Murder - PSCCS Code 0101002



Categories of Crime / Sections

- Acts leading to death or intending to cause death
- Acts causing harm or intending to cause harm to the person
- 3 Injurious acts of a sexual nature
- 4 Acts against property involving violence or threat against a person
- 5 Acts against property only
- 6 Acts involving controlled drugs or other psychoactive substances
- 7 Acts involving fraud, deception or corruption
- 8 Acts against public order, authority and provisions of the State
- 9 Acts against public safety and state security
- 10 Acts against the natural environment
- Other criminal acts not elsewhere classified



AND SPECIAL LAWS

All criminal offenses in the **Revised Penal** Code and Special Laws in force are included in the PSCCS.



Examples:

- 1. Cheating in the Civil Service Examination
- 2. Failing to file Statement of Assets and Liabilities
- 3. Obstructing the display of graphic health warnings



ICCS Offenses not found in the **Philippines**

Examples:

- 1. Acts against the King or the Royal Family
- 2. Euthanasia
- 3. Grave digging 4. Dowry-related killings
- 5. Honor killings
