WAGE RATES IN INDUSTRIES

... in Transport, Storage and Communications (Ninth of an 18-Part Series on 2006 OWS)

This issue of the LABSTAT Updates on the results of the 2006 Occupational Wages Survey (OWS) focuses on the wage rates of 31 occupations in transport, storage and communications. For purposes of monitoring occupational wage rates in this major industry group, six industry groups were chosen: other land transport except bus line operation, transport via pipelines; bus line operation; water transport; air transport; supporting and auxiliary transport activities and activities of travel agencies; and postal and telecommunications services except national postal activities. The average monthly wage rates of the selected occupations ranged from P 6,405 to P 60,313.

The wage rates of other occupations in specific industries covered in the OWS are posted on the BLES website.

Aircraft pilots, navigators and flight engineers were highest paid while unskilled workers were least paid

Among the selected occupations in transport, storage and communications, aircraft pilots, navigators and flight engineers in air transport had the highest average wage rate at P60,313. This was almost 6 times higher than the national average at P10,629. This occupation also recorded the highest average wage rate over all 169 occupations monitored in the 2006 OWS.

Least paid were unskilled workers except janitors, messengers and freight handlers in other land transport except bus line operation at \$\mathbb{P}6,405\$.

Communication service supervisors in postal and telecommunications services received the highest average wage rate at P22,385 compared to service supervisors in the other industry groups. Road transport supervisors in bus line operation were paid the lowest at P8,495. (Figure 1)




Average monthly basic pay and allowances in transport, storage and communications exceeded national averages


The median monthly basic pay of time rate workers in transport, storage and communications was estimated at P9,593. This was 19.4% higher than the all-industry monthly basic pay of P8,035.

Basic pay differentials were noted among the industry groups. It was highest in

air transport at \$\mathbb{P}20,036\$, which is more than twice the major industry group average. High monthly basic pay was also noted in postal and telecommunications services at \$\mathbb{P}16,023\$. Median monthly basic pay in the other three subindustries were below \$\mathbb{P}10,000\$. Average monthly cash allowances in transport, storage and communications stood at P1,289, slightly exceeding the national median allowance at P1.278.

For sub-industries, the allowances ranged from P1,182 in supporting and auxiliary transport activities to P1,665 in water transport. (Figure 3)

Definition of Terms:

- o Basic pay refers to pay for normal/regular working time before deductions for employees' social security contributions and withholding taxes. It excludes overtime, night shift differential and other premium pay; commissions, tips and share of employees in service charge; and payment in kind.
- o Allowances refer to regular/guaranteed cash payments. These include cost of living allowance but exclude reimbursements for travel, entertainment, meals and other expenses, etc. incurred in conducting the business of the employer; cost of uniform/working clothes; bonuses and gratuities; family allowances.
- o Median divides the wage distribution into two equal parts. It is the value where half of the workers in the distribution receive more while the other half receives less.
