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# STATISTICS ON PART-TIME WORKERS

IN NON-AGRICULTURAL ESTABLISHMENTS WITH 20 OR MORE WORKERS: June 2008

(Sixth of a series on Employment)



This LABSTAT Updates is the sixth in a series of reports that focuses on employment based on the results of the 2007/2008 BLES Integrated Survey (BITS) conducted in 2008 in coordination with the DOLE Regional Offices. The BITS is a nationwide survey covering 6,460 sample non-agricultural establishments with 20 or more workers. This issue presents statistics on part-time workers and the extent of their engagement across industry groups and employment sizes.

### **OVERVIEW**

Most workers are employees of organizations for which they carry out their assignments and have an established schedule for reporting for work and payment of wages. There always have been exceptions, however, such as part-time workers whose work schedule deviates from the standard full-time (eight hours a day) regular wage and salary employment.

The International Labor Office (ILO) defined part-time work as: a single, regular or voluntary form of hours employment with work substantially shorter than those considered as the normal to establishment.

In the Philippines, part-time workers are accorded the same protection under the Philippine Labor Code as with full-time workers with respect to security of tenure, payment of statutory benefits and retirements.

This issue presents statistics on the extent of employment of part-time workers in non-agricultural establishments with 20 or more workers based on the results of the 2007/2008 BITS. The report also looks into the profile of establishments that employed this type of workers.

# **Definition of Terms**

- Time-rate workers workers paid on the basis of a time unit of work such as an hour, a day or a month.
- Part-time workers workers who work at jobs which provide less than the working time normal to the establishment.

# **SURVEY RESULTS**

Part-time workers accounted for only a small proportion of the workforce of the establishments covered by the survey. They comprised merely 3.0% (91,327) of the total 3.012 million employed workers in the establishments covered as of June 2008.

As shown in Table 1, total employment consists mostly (94.6%) of full-time workers. Of the total employed, 53.1% were paid on a monthly basis, 39.0% on a daily basis and 2.5% on an hourly basis.

# Industry

Part-time workers were prevalent in three (3) industries. Their main employers were hotels and which accounted restaurants for 32,491 or 21.6% of the 150,501 total employed in this industry. services are normally availed of during peak business hours when bigger volume of customers requires additional service crew.

Private educational institutions ranked second with 27,474 or 12.0% of the 229,710 workers in this industry. They were most likely to be professionals who moonlight as part-time instructors in colleges and universities.

Construction industry is the third largest sector with a share of 8,973 or 9.4% of its total workforce of 95,152. The services of both skilled and non-skilled part-time workers were required in construction process where building and civil engineering works in general are of short durations.

# **Employment Size**

The majority of part-time workers were hired by small establishments (20 to 99 workers) apparently to supplement their regular workforce. Of the 805,130 total employment in these establishments, 5.6% or 44,975 were part-time workers.

On the other hand, large establishments (200 or more workers) employed only a small proportion of part-time workers at 2.0% or 36,667 of its total employment (1,825,047).
