## SURVEY OF J OB VACANCIES

IN LARGE ENTERPRISES IN METRO MANILA Third Quarter 2010


## . . . Highest number of vacancies since Third Quarter 2009


#### Abstract

This issue presents statistics on job vacancies in large enterprises based in Metro Manila for the third quarter of 2010. Data were based on the results of the Labor Turnover Survey (LTS) conducted by the Bureau of Labor and Employment Statistics (BLES) for that period.

The LTS covered more than 600 respondents that were drawn from the 2009 Edition of the Philippines Top 10,000 Corporations as compiled by the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC). Considered as industry trendsetters, firms covered by the LTS provide timely signals on labor demand in the formal sector of the economy. Job vacancies refer to the number of unfilled job openings, which are immediately available for placement and for which active recruitment steps are being undertaken anytime during the reference period.

This report attempts to capture the distribution of labor demand by type of occupations/skills in the enterprises covered by the survey. Statistics from this report were based on sample data.


## SURVEY RESULTS

## More than 8,500 vacancies were available for placement

- A total of 8,662 positions in various occupational groups and industries were available for placement in the third quarter of 2010. Vacancies went up by more than two-folds (121.1\%) from 3,917 unfilled positions during the second quarter of 2010, and increased by more than four-folds from 2,040 vacancies in the first quarter. (Table 2)
- The services sector dominated the vacancy roll with 8,161 openings ( $94.2 \%$ ). Three of its sub-sectors had the most number of job offerings. Real estate, renting and business activities alone had 5,946 out of 8,662 job openings ( $68.6 \%$ ) - the bulk of positions came from a BPO company with 5,322 vacancies for the third quarter alone.
- Financial intermediation with 926 ( $10.7 \%$ ); and transport, storage and communications with 529 vacancies (6.1\%) came in second and third, respectively.
- Agriculture, fishery and forestry offered the fewest job openings among the three industry sectors: fishing with 11 ( $0.1 \%$ ) and agriculture, hunting and forestry with 13 (0.2\%) vacant positions.


## Job openings in $\mathbf{2 5 0}$ enterprises

- Out of 676 enterprises, 250 (37.0\%) had job openings during the third quarter of 2010.


## Wanted: technical and commercial sales representatives

- There was a high demand for technical and commercial sales representatives (e.g., technical sales representative, sales consultant, and sales analyst), as 2,929 unfilled positions were ready for placement. Customer service representatives/associates came in second with 2,636 vacancies. Job opportunities were also available for tellers and other counter clerks (175), and receptionists and information clerks (175). The top ten occupations with the most number of vacancies accounted for $79.9 \%$ of the total number of vacancies recorded during the quarter. (Table 1)

- Among professionals, accountants and auditors appeared consistently in the list of vacant occupations during the three quarters. IT-related workers (e.g., systems analysts and designers, and computer programmers); and college and university teaching professionals were also in demand. (Table 3)
