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# **HIGHLIGHTS OF THE OCTOBER 2007** LABOR FORCE SURVEY

#### **Overview**

Employment continued to grow (1.5%) in October 2007 despite of the adverse impact of the dry spell on agricultural employment. Growth was posted highest in industry sector (3.7%) driven by the strong growth in construction sub-sector (7.0%). On the other hand, service sector employment grew at a modest pace (1.9%) on account of the decline in wholesale and retail trade and hotels and restaurants. The quality of employment improved as more people found full-time work and the incidence of underemployment fell by more than one percentage point (20.4% to 18.1%). Similarly, unemployment declined both in terms of rate (7.3% to 6.3%) and magnitude.

Starting with January 2007 Labor Force Survey (LFS), the population projections based on the 2000 Census of Population was adopted to generate the labor force statistics. This is in compliance with NSCB Resolution No. 1 series 2005 "Adoption of the Methodology Used in Generating the 2000 Census of Population and Housing-Based National Population Projections.

#### Labor Force

The country's working age 1.6% population grew by (+876,000) over the period. This was accompanied by a much slower growth in the labor force which 0.3% expanded by mere а (+111,000) to reach 35,919 million.

This occurred as more people stayed out of the labor force in October as reflected by the increase in the number of "persons not in the labor force" by 765,000 or 3.8% from 20.180 million to 20.945 million.

As a consequence, labor force participation rate (LFPR) in October dropped by almost a full percentage point (-0.8%) to 63.2%. This is the lowest participation rate recorded in all survey rounds of 2007.

# Employment

Employment level expanded by 1.5% in October. Total employed persons increased to 33.671 million from 33.188 million a year ago of the same period. This translates to additional new employed of nearly half a million (+483,000) persons.

- Growth in employment was highest in the industry sector which grew by 3.7% (+181,000)
   mainly on the strength of the robust increase in employment in the construction sub-sector (+7.0% or +114,000).
- Service sector employment grew by a modest 1.9% (+313,000) with transport, storage and communications (+130,000),private households with employed persons (+72,000)and real estate, renting and business activities (+68,000)as main employment generators. On the other hand, slump were noted in wholesale and retail trade (-51,000)and hotels and restaurants (-9,000).
- Employment in the combined agriculture, hunting and forestry was about unchanged from last year (+0.1% or +9,000).
   Meanwhile, employment in the fishing sector fell slightly by 1.4% (-20,000) over the period.
- Persons in full-time employment rose by 5.2% (+1.063 million) while those in part-time employment fell by 3.1% (-384,000).

Growth also occurred among wage and salary workers and self-employed (+442,000)workers (+292,000) while decline was noted among employers (-99,000)and unpaid family workers (-151,000).

# Underemployment

- The number of underemployed persons who want or expressed the desire for additional hours of work declined by 658,000 from 6.762 million to 6.104 million. This corresponds to underemployment rate of 18.1%, down from 20.4% a year before.
- Invisibly underemployed persons (i.e., person who worked 40 hours or more a week and still wanting additional hours of work) also declined by 600,000 – from 4.168 million to 3.568 million.

# UNEMPLOYMENT

Unemployment fell both in terms of rate (from 7.3% to 6.3%) and number (from 2.620 million to 2.248 million).

The unemployed workforce were dominated by young persons 15 to 25 years old which comprised a little more than half (51.0% or million) the 1.146 of total unemployed. Persons in the prime working age 25 to 54 years old ranked a close second (45.1% or 1.013 million) and those aged 55 years old and over constituted 4.0% (89,000).

- Nearly two in every three unemployed were men (1.427 million or 63.5%).
- The majority (46.2% or 1.038 million) were high school graduates or undergraduates. Equally large were college undergraduates and graduates (39.5% or 888,000). Only a small proportion were elementary educated (13.7% or 308,000) or without formal school training (0.7% or 15,000).
