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## **HIGHLIGHTS OF THE JANUARY 2008** LABOR FORCE SURVEY

#### **Overview**

The country's employment situation in January 2008 improved slightly compared to the same period last year. Gains in employment occurred mainly in the combined agriculture, fishery and forestry sector (1.3%) with industry sector employment remaining unchanged (0.1%) and service sector employment posting a small decline (-0.1%). The quality of employment was mixed. More people found full-time employment but wage and salary employment fell (-2.7%) over the period.

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On the bright note, unemployment rate fell to 7.4% from 7.8% a year ago. Moreover, the incidence of underemployment eases considerably to 18.9% from 21.5% last year. Labor force participation rate (LFPR) declined over the period, i.e., from 64.8% to 63.4%.

Starting with January 2007 Labor Force Survey (LFS), the population projections based on the 2000 Census of Population was adopted to generate the labor force statistics. This is in compliance with NSCB Resolution No. 1 series 2005 "Adoption of the Methodology Used in Generating the 2000 Census of Population and Housing-Based National Population Projections."

#### Labor Force

The country's household population 15 years old and over grew by 2.2% (+1.244 million) in January 2008 compared with the same period last year. This was accompanied by a slight decline in the labor force which contracted by 0.1% (-25,000) to reach 36.370 million.

This occurred as more people in January stayed out of the labor force which resulted to the increase in the number of "persons not in the labor force" by 1.269 million - from 19.750 million to 21.019 million.

As a consequence, labor force participation rate (LFPR) in January dropped by 1.4 percentage points to 63.4%. This is the lowest participation rate ever recorded for the month of January since 2005.

#### Employment

Employment level grew by 0.4% (+150,000) as total employed persons increased from 33.545 million to 33.695 million. The modest growth was expected as it came from a higher base last year. It should be noted that employment in January last year expanded by a robust 4.7% (+1.514 million) – the highest of the four LFS survey rounds conducted in 2007.

- Employment growth originated mainly from the agricultural sector which increased by 1.3% (+156,000). This is a turnaround from last year's slump of 0.3% (-39,000).
- Industry sector employment was about unchanged growing by just 0.1% (+4,000). Growth occurred in construction (+73,000), mining quarrying (+8,000) and and electricity, gas and water supply (+2,000). These gains were negated by the fall in manufacturing employment (-78,000) due to the weak value of dollar and higher prices of oil products.
- Service sector employment fell 0.1% (-11,000). slightly by Employment reduction was caused by the slump in three sub-sectors, namely: private with households employed persons (- 122,000), wholesale and retail trade (-84,000) and other community, social and personal activities (-12,000). The decline can be attributed to the continuing appreciation of the Philippine peso and higher prices consumer products of which dampened demand for goods and services.

Meanwhile, employment gains were noted in five (5) sub-sectors led by public administration and defense; compulsory social security (+72,000); transport, storage and communications (+68,000) and education (+51,000).

- Persons in full-time employment rose by 1.6% (+329,000) while those in part-time employment fell by 1.4% (-167,000).
- By class of worker, the gainers were self-employed workers (+685,000) and unpaid family workers (+242,000). On the other hand, the losers were wage and salary workers (-490,000) and employers (-288,000).

### Underemployment

The number of underemployed persons who wanted or expressed the desire for additional hours of work declined sharply by 844,000 – from 7.214 million to 6.370 million. This corresponds to underemployment rate of 18.9%, down from 21.5% a year before.

 Time-related underemployment (i.e., total number of persons who worked less than 40 hours a week and still wanting additional hours of work) also declined by 268,000 – from 4.165 million to 3.897 million.

### Unemployment

Unemployment fell both in terms of rate (from 7.8% to 7.4%) and number (from 2.850 million to 2.675 million).

 The unemployed workforce were dominated by young persons 15 to 25 years old which comprised nearly half (46.6% or 1.328 million) of the total unemployed. Persons in the prime working age 25 to 54 years old ranked close second (43.7% or 1.245 million) and the rest (3.6% or 102,000) by those 55 years old and over.

- Nearly two in every three unemployed were men (61.1% or 1.741).
- The majority (43.4% or 1.238 million) were high school graduates or undergraduates.

Equally large were college undergraduates and graduates (36.2% or 1.031 million). Only a small proportion were elementary educated (13.9% or 396,000) or without formal school training (0.4% or 10,000).
