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THE UNEMPLOYED PERSONS in 2011


The Labor Force Survey (LFS), conducted every January, April, July and October by the National Statistics Office, defines the unemployed as those persons 15 years old and over who are: i) without work or had no job/business; ii) looking or seeking work; and iii) currently available for work during the past reference week or within two weeks from the interview date. Also included as part of the unemployed are those who were without work and available for work but did not look for work due to what are considered as valid reasons: i) tired/believe no work was available; ii) awaiting results of previous job application; iii) temporary illness/ disability; iv) bad weather; and v) waiting for rehire/job recall.


This issue of LABSTAT Updates provides demographic and economic characteristics of unemployed persons in 2011.

In 2011, the size of the unemployed was estimated at 2.814 million. They accounted for 7.0% of the 40.006 million labor force.

Demographic Characteristics

- Unemployed men made up more than three-fifths (63.0%) of the total 2.8 million. More than half (50.4%) were young persons aged 15-24 years old, almost all of whom were not currently attending school. On the other hand, 45.8% of the unemployed were in their prime age (25-54 years old) while a minimal share (3.8%) were elderly (55 and over). (Figure 1)
- More than two-thirds were single while more than one-fourth were married. Most of the unemployed were not heads of their households (86.7%).
- The unemployed were largely educated as 87.1% had reached high school or college. Combined together, high school graduates (33.5%) and college graduates (20.2%) totaled to more than half of the unemployed.
- More than 50.0% of the unemployed were located in the National Capital Region (20.1%), Regions III (12.7%) and IV-A (17.8%). These three posted unemployment rates of 11.3%, 8.5% and 9.7%, respectively, which were higher than the national average (7.0%). (Figure 2)








Economic Characteristics


- About eight out of every 10 unemployed have been previously employed while 9.0% looked for work for the first time. These first time unemployed (252,000) together with those employed for the first time (576,000) comprised the 828,000 new entrants to the labor force in 2011.
- Of the total unemployed, almost the same proportions looked for work (49.3%) and did not look for work (50.7%).
- The leading job search methods of the 1.386 million who looked for work were: direct application to employer (36.7%), through relatives or friends (31.8%) and registration in public or private employment agencies (23.5%). Only 6.2% (86,000) went to public employment agencies. The average duration of job search was 5.1 weeks. (Figure 3)
- Those who believed that no work is available (28.4%), waiting for results of previous job application (27.3%) and waiting for rehire/job recall (29.2%) mostly comprised the 1.428 million who did not look for work. (Figure 4)
- There were 2.166 million unemployed who had work experience. Almost three-fifths of them used to be laborers and unskilled workers (35.1%) and service workers and shop and market sales workers (23.2%). (*Figure 5*)

Overall Trend

 Unemployment rates have remained at one-digit level since 2005. On an annual average, it went down from 8.0% in 2006 to its latest lowest point at 7.0% in 2011, which is within the 6.8-7.2% annual target of the 2011-2016 Philippine Development Plan.
