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HIGHLIGHTS OF THE APRIL 2012 LABOR FORCE SURVEY



Overview

Employment continued its growth momentum in April 2012 with net employment generation exceeding the average one million target per year in the 2011-2016 Philippine Development Plan. All three broad sectors recorded employment gains - with industry posting the strongest growth (5.2%) followed by agriculture, fishery and forestry (2.6%) and services (2.2%). Furthermore, unemployment rate was down to 6.9% from 7.2% a year earlier.

However, the quality of employment remained an issue with little improvement in underemployment rate (19.3%) and lower mean hours worked compared last year. On the positive note, more people found wage and salary employment while the proportion of self-employed and unpaid family workers to total employed (a Millennium Development Indicator) fell marginally.

The Labor Force Survey (LFS) is conducted by the National Statistics Office every January, April, July and October. The preliminary results are released 45 days after the reference period.

Labor Force

The size of the country's labor force in April 2012 continued to expand (2.4% or +953,000) - but at slower pace compared with the same period last year (3.1% or +1.179 million). Specifically, the number of persons in the labor force increased to 40.644 million from 39.691 million. This corresponds to labor force participation rate (LFPR) of 64.7%, upped by 0.5 percentage point in 2012.

The LFS indicates a marked increase in the participation rate (+1.5 percentage points) among the youth (15-24 years old and over). In contrast, participation rates in other age cohorts were of little change.

Employment

Following a marked recovery last year (4.0% or +1.407 million), employment level grew by another

2.8% (+1.021 million) in April 2012. Over this period, total employed persons increased to 37.841 million from 36.820 million which translates to net employment gains of more million. than а This figure represents a departure from the "boom and bust" pattern observed in This pattern past. characterized by a robust growth in one quarter and then followed by a slump in the same quarter of the succeeding year.

Growth was broad-based occurring in all three sectors but was most pronounced in the industry sector which expanded 5.2% (+294,000)by substantial improvement from just 2.4% (+132,000) growth recorded а year ago. occurred as the country's exports recovered from the previous year's slump. (Table 2)

Agriculture, fishery and forestry sector posted a lower growth (2.6% or +315,000) as compared with 2011 (5.6% or +643,000) - due in large part to the floods and continued rains in Mindanao.

Meanwhile, the services sector continued to absorb the bulk of the total employed workforce (51.4% or 19.457 million). For this period, employment in this sector grew by 2.2% (+412,000) - a slowdown from 3.4% (+631,000) in 2011.

■ By class of worker, persons in wage and salary employment were the biggest gainer (3.7% or 748,000). Smaller gains were reported among self-employed persons (+167,000) and among persons who worked without pay in own family-operated farm or business (+142,000). In contrast, the number of employers in own family-operated farm or business fell by 2.9% (-38,000).

The proportion of self-employed persons and unpaid family workers to total employed was of little change - increasing marginally to 41.5% from 41.2%.

The key setback for the period under review is the reduction in mean hours of work during the reference week which fell to 39.2 from 40.9 a year earlier. This is due to the rise in the proportion of those who worked less than 40 hours (part-time employment) to 42.8% from 37.1% a year ago.

The spike in part-time employment could be "voluntary" as this was not matched by a corresponding large increase in visible underemployment, persons wanting additional hours Moreover, work. phenomenon could be a "fluke" or temporary in nature and hence needs further validations in the next survey rounds to arrive at a conclusion.

Employment growth was mixed across regions. Seven (7) regions recorded higher growth rates than the national average of 2.8%: Region IV-A (3.7%), Region V (9.7%), Region VII (8.6%), Region XI (3.3%), Caraga (3.3%) and ARMM (6.0%).

In contrast, employment growth rates in three (3) big regions fell sharply to less than one percent, namely: NCR (3.5% to 0.6%), Region III (6.7% to 0.8%) and Region VI (4.4% to 0.9%). Meanwhile, employment growth was modest in CAR (1.7%), Region IX (1.6%) and down slightly in Region I (-0.2%).

Underemployment

- Underemployment rate in April 2012 was of little change declining slightly to 19.3% from 19.4%. In terms of level, the underemployed number of persons rose by 185,000 to reach 7.312 million. The biggest increase occurred in the services sector (+96,000) followed by agriculture (+52,000)and industry (+37,000). (Table 3)
- Meanwhile, visible underemployment rate was up to 12.8% from 12.0% last year. This translates to 449,000 additional persons working less than 40 hours a week and wanting additional hours of work. This brings the total number of visibly underemployed persons to 4.851 million.

Unemployment

With the growth in employment or +1.021 million) again outpacing the growth in labor force (2.4% or +0.953million). unemployed number of persons declined by 68,000 to 2.803 million in April 2012. This translates to a 0.3 percentage point reduction unemployment rate, i.e., from 7.2% to 6.9%.

Young workers (aged 15 to 24 years old) comprised a little more than one-half (51.7% or 1.450 million) of the total unemployed workforce. Youth unemployment

- rate eased slightly to 16.0% from 16.6% a year ago. (Table 4)
- About five in eight every unemployed were men (1.746 million or 62.3%). Compared with last year, unemployment rate of men was down by 0.6 percentage point to 7.0% and was unchanged among women at 6.7%.
- The majority (44.5% or 1.247 million) were high school graduates or undergraduates. Equally large were college undergraduates and graduates (34.8% or 0.975 million). About 8.0% (225,000) were graduates undergraduates post secondary education, i.e., technical and vocational courses
- Six (6) regions have unemployment rates higher than the national rate of 6.9%: NCR (10.4%), Region I (8.0%), Region III (8.0%), Region IV-A (8.8%), Region VI (7.0%) and Region VII (7.2%). (Table 5)
- Compared with last year, reduction in unemployment rates occurred in eight (8) regions with the most notable in NCR (11.6% to 10.4%), Region I (9.8% to 8.0%) and Region IV-A (10.0%) 8.8%). Meanwhile, notable increases in unemployment rates were observed in Region VII (6.2% to 7.2%), Region XI (5.4% to 6.4%), Region IX (3.2 to 4.1%) and Region IV-B (3.9% to 4.7%).
