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Safety and Health Practices in Establishments: 2010 (Fourth of a Series on Industrial Relations Practices)

The Bureau of Labor and Employment Statistics (BLES), in coordination with the DOLE Regional Offices, conducted the 2009/2010 BLES Integrated Survey (BITS) of non-agricultural establishments employing 20 or more workers nationwide. The main objective of the survey is to generate integrated data sets on employment of specific groups of workers, occupational shortages and surpluses, balancing work and family responsibilities and working time arrangements, occupational safety and health practices, and occupational injuries and diseases.

This series of LABSTAT Updates specifically focuses on the results of the survey on the extent of unionism and collective bargaining in the country, balancing work and family responsibilities and working time arrangements, and health and safety practices adopted/implemented by 23,723 estimated establishments as of June 2010.

This issue presents the highlights of the survey on safety and health practices adopted and implemented by establishments, focusing on the safety and health practices in establishments in the forms of preventive and control measures implemented, occupational safety and health policies/programs adopted, facilities and amenities provided, OSH trainings/seminars conducted and on the health and safety personnel of the establishments. The metadata and statistical tables of the survey are posted at the BLES website.

Preventive and Control Measures/ Activities Implemented on Safety and Health

 Of the total 23,723 non-agricultural establishments in 2010, about 4 out of every 5 establishments conducted regular inspection and maintenance of equipment (79.5%); and maintenance of mechanical and electrical facilities (77.8%) as part of their preventive and control measures on work safety and health hazards. 


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- The top 2 abovementioned measures were implemented by more than 85.0% of the establishments engaged in health and social work except public health services; mining and quarrying; electricity, gas and water; and manufacturing.
- About 42.3% of the establishments conducted random drug testing of officers and employees. (Table 1)
- Strict observance of medical confidentiality of status and identity of with HIV were likewise person implemented in 29.0% of the establishments.
- Only one out of every 4 establishments submitted reports on illnesses and injuries to the DOLE Bureau of Working Conditions (26.9%).

Occupational Safety and Health Policies/Programs Implemented

- Relative to the maintenance of safety and health conditions at the workplaces, establishments one half of the implemented Accident Prevention Program (51.0%)and **Emergency Preparedness** Program Response (50.3%). (Figure 2)
- About 4 out of every 5 establishments in construction industry implemented accident prevention program (80.0%) while emergency response
- preparedness program was implemented by most establishments in health and social work except public health services (81.4%).
- Only a small proportion of establishments had policies on HIV and AIDS prevention (16.0%) and nondiscrimination of workers confirmed/ suspected/perceived to have HIV infection (13.4%). (Table 2)




Facilities and Amenities Provided

- More than 90.0% of the establishments had the following facilities/amenities: toilets with water supply (96.5%); fire protecting equipment (94.7%); lighting in work areas, aisles and passageways (92.9%); supply of safe drinking water (92.5%); and space that allow freedom of movement to perform duties (91.4%). (Table 3)
- Of the establishments that did not provide some of the safety and health facilities, the following were the reasons cited: "not needed" or "not applicable" (95.5%); no available space (29.5%); very few workers (10.6%); and too costly (6.5%).

OSH-related Trainings/Seminars


- Establishments provided various trainings/seminars on safety and health to their employees for the last two years. Foremost was the training on fire safety conducted in 7 out of every 10 establishments (69.1%). (Figure 3)
- Other trainings/seminars provided were emergency preparedness training (40.4%);total quality management (35.4%);one-dav orientation occupational safety and health (34.9%); and safety audit/accident investigation (31.6%). Meanwhile, only 15.5% of the establishments provided seminars on and AIDS prevention workplace. (Table 4)
- About 4 out of every 5 of the establishments had availed of the

- assistance of other agencies in the conduct of some OSH trainings. Around 1 in every 5 establishments conducted in-house trainings sponsored by the Fire Department's local units in their areas (19.7%).
- Other agencies similarly tapped by establishments in the conduct of OSH trainings were the Occupational Safety and Health Center (10.1%); NGOs/ Universities/Academic Institutions (10.0%);DOLE Regional Offices (9.2%); Industry Associations (7.2%); and Employers Associations (7.0%). Only few establishments sought the assistance of the Bureau of Working Conditions (4.3%)and Trade Unions/Federations (2.2%)in the conduct of safety and health trainings.



Designated Health and Safety Personnel

 Almost 70.0% of the establishments relied on the services of the nearest clinic/hospital (68.5%) in administering medical services to their employees. Around 1 out of every 3 establishments had safety officers (33.7%) while 1 out of every 4 of establishments had trained first-aiders (24.5%) or registered nurses (24.1%). Only 15.0% had physicians as their designated safety and health personnel. (Figure 4)
