Extent of Unionism and Collective Bargaining in Establishments: 2012

(First of a Series on Industrial Relations Practices)

This LABSTAT Updates, the first in the series on Industrial Relations Practices, is culled from the results of the 2011/2012 BLES Integrated Survey (BITS). The BITS covers establishments employing 20 or more workers nationwide.

This series of LABSTAT Updates focuses on the extent of unionism and collective bargaining in the country, recruitment and hiring practices for entry-level jobs, and occupational safety and health practices adopted/implemented by establishments.

Survey results on unionism and collective bargaining are based on estimates and are therefore not comparable with other published statistics based on administrative reports. Similarly, caution should be observed in comparing results with the previous years' surveys due to the following changes in the 2012 BITS: (1) inclusion of the agricultural sector in the survey; and (2) the shift from 1994 Philippine Standard Industrial Classification (PSIC) to the 2009 PSIC.

EXTENT OF UNIONISM

8.9 % of total establishments have unions


- Results of the survey showed that 8.9% (2,332) of the 26,253 agricultural and non-agricultural establishments with 20 or more workers in 2012 have unions. (Table 1)
- Specifically, around 9.0% of non-agricultural establishments had unions.
 This is comparatively higher than the 8.7% reported in 2010. Agricultural establishments on the other hand, posted a lower share of 5.7% in 2012.
- Among industries, electricity, gas, steam and air conditioning supply industry was the most unionized, as it posted the largest proportion of establishments with unions at 41.0%. This was followed by mining and quarrying (23.2%); financial and insurance activities (22.0%); and water

- supply, sewerage, waste management and remediation activities (21.2%). Real estate activities; and administrative and support service activities had the least share of unionized establishments, at only 0.4%, each. Professional, scientific and technical activities industry had no union at all.
- Based on ownership, 19.0% (145 out of 764) of multinational establishments had unions. The shares were considerably lower in joint venture establishments, as well as in wholly Filipino-owned and foreign-owned establishments at 12.5%, 8.5% and 7.9%, respectively.
- By employment size, about 1 out of every 5 (20.6%) establishments with 200 or more workers had unions. It was much lower in establishments employing 100-199 workers with a share of 13.6%. Least unionized were establishments with 20-99 workers at only 5.9%.

9.9% of workers are members of unions

- Union density rate (proportion of union membership to total paid employees) nationwide was recorded at 9.9% or 371,178 out of the aggregate 3.739 million paid employees. In the nonagricultural sector, union density rate had declined to 9.3%, from 10.6% reported in 2010. (Table 2)
- By industry, high density rates were observed in electricity, gas, steam and conditioning supply (33.4%);and insurance financial activities (29.3%);mining and quarrying (26.8%); transportation and storage (23.2%); and agriculture, forestry and (23.1%).Conversely, administrative and support service

- activities; and real estate activities posted the lowest, at only 0.3% and 0.2%, respectively. (Figure 1)
- Joint venture establishments exhibited the highest union density rate in 2012 at 14.1%. Multinational establishments ranked second with 11.1%, followed closely by wholly Filipino-owned establishments at 10.4%. Wholly foreign-owned establishments had the least share at 6.1%. (Table 3)
- About 12.2% of the employees in establishments employing 200 or more workers were members of unions. The proportions were slightly lower for employees in establishments with 100-199 workers (8.6%) and in establishments with 20-99 workers (4.0%).

EXTENT OF COLLECTIVE BARGAINING

Almost all (97.3%) establishments with unions have CBAs

 Almost all or 97.3% (2,269 out of 2,332) of both agricultural and nonagricultural establishments with unions in 2012 had negotiated a collective bargaining agreement (CBA). However, this is equivalent to only 8.6% share to total establishments. (*Table 1*)


Notably, all unionized establishments in the following industries had CBAs: construction; information communication; financial and insurance activities: real estate activities: administrative and support service activities; private education; human health and social work activities except activities; public health arts,

entertainment and recreation; and repair of computers and personal and household goods, and other personal service activities.

Workers covered by CBAs reported at 10.3%

- Collective bargaining coverage rate which is the proportion of employees covered by CBAs was reported at 10.3% (383,390 out of 3.739 million employees). (Table 2)
- Specifically, employees in nonagricultural establishments reported a coverage rate of 9.6%, a 1.3 percentage point decline from 8.3% reported in 2010.
- Similar with union density rates, higher CBA coverage rates were reported in the following industries: electricity, gas, steam and air conditioning supply (32.4%); financial and insurance activities (31.5%); mining and quarrying (26.2%); transportation and

- storage (23.2%); and agriculture, forestry and fishing (23.1%). (Figure 2)
- In contrast, low coverage rates were noted in real estate activities; and administrative and support service activities at 0.4% and 0.3%, respectively.
- Joint venture establishments posted the highest CBA coverage at 15.0% (24,525 out of 163,503 workers) in 2012. Multinational companies came next with 11.5%, followed closely by wholly Filipino-owned establishments at 10.7%. Foreign-owned establishments had the least share at 6.5%. (Table 2)
- As to employment size, about 1 out of every 8 employees (12.7%) in establishments with 200 or more workers were covered by CBAs. Only 8.4% and 4.1% of workers were covered in establishments employing 100-199 workers and 20-99 workers, respectively.

EXTENT OF WOMEN PARTICIPATION IN UNIONISM

- Women comprised 36.2% (134,193) of the total union membership in 2012. (Table 3)
- By major industry group, а predominance of women union members were evident in the service industries particularly in the following: repair of computers and personal and household goods, and other personal activities (76.6%);human health and social work activities except health activities public (68.1%);activities financial and insurance (63.6%); education and private (61.6%).
- Significantly, women accounted for 16.6% (1 out of every 6) of the total

- union presidents and 22.8% (2 out of every 9) of the union officers in 2012. Notably, women headed all unions in the repair of computers and personal and household goods, and other personal service activities industry. More than half (53.0%) of union presidents in private education were women.
- High proportions of women union officers were likewise observed in the following industries: repair computers and personal and household goods, and other personal service activities (83.3%); real estate activities (53.8%); human health and social work activities except public health activities (45.5%);financial and insurance activities (41.7%);and private education (41.0%).
