DEPARTMENT OF LABOR AND EMPLOYMENT
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The Labor Force Survey In BriefJanuary (1999-2000)

OVERVIEW

The results of the January 2000 Labor Force Survey (LFS) indicate little change in the country's labor market situation in comparison to the same period last year. Unemployment rate, which stood at 9.3 percent, was up by a negligible 0.3 percentage point while employment level managed to post positive growth (+1.9) despite continuing decline in construction. On a brighter note, the incidence of underemployment declined to 21.2 percent, almost a full percent point (0.9%) drop from last year. Also, manufacturing employment, which suffered a slump (-0.9% or -24,000) in 1999, has started to show signs of recovery posting a modest growth (+0.7% or +19,000) in January this year. Service sector employment continued to exhibit strong employment growth (+3.6%) this period.

LABOR FORCE AND PARTICIPATION RATE

The country's labor force population reached 31,848 million in January 2000, about 2.2 percent (+680,000) higher than the January 1999 estimate. This translates to a labor force participation rate (LFPR) of 65.1 percent, down 0.2 percentage point from last year.

EMPLOYMENT

Employment level expanded during the period by 1.9 percent (+527,000) - a slowdown from 2.4 percent growth (+679,000) registered in the previous year.

In absolute terms, employment level increased to 28.895 million from 28.368 million recorded in January 1999.

Sectoral Employment

Agriculture, Fishery and Forestry

After recovering last year from the severe slump caused by the two-year dry spell, agricultural employment continued to post positive gain in January 2000 increasing by 1.0 percent or additional 109,000 workers from previous year level.

Industry

Industry employment declined slightly by -0.7 percent (-31,000) from 4.447 million recorded last year. was brought about mainly by the employment slump in electricity, gas and water (-17,000) and the continuing decline in construction (-39,000).Manufacturing employment, which suffered a decline (-24,000) last year due to the effect of the financial crisis, bounced back this year to register a modest increase (+19,000).

Service

The service sector posted the biggest gain in employment (+449,000). The sub-sectors which contributed the biggest gains were wholesale and retail trade (+207,000) and community, social and personal services (+172,000).

Hours of Work

Persons in full-time employment (worked 40 hours or more a week) increased by 1.8 percent (+333,000) over the year ago level to reach 18.365 million. On the other hand, the number of persons in part-time employment (worked less than 40 hours a week) also posted an increase (+229,000) to 10.128 million.

Class of Worker

Wage and salary workers continued to account for the bulk of the employment increases (+283,000). Worthy of note, however, was the rise in employment of own-account workers (+193,000) and the slightly lower than last year growth in employment of unpaid family worker (+51,000).

UNEMPLOYMENT

The number of unemployed persons in January 2000 stood at 2.953 million, a little change (+153,000) from the level recorded in similar period last year. This corresponds to unemployment rate of 9.3 percent, about unchanged from 9.0 percent a year ago.

Four (4) regions recorded double-digit unemployment rates: NCR (16.2%), Region IV (10.5%) and Region VII (10.1%).

The youth (15-24 years old) which accounted for nearly one-half (45.5%) of

unemployed persons posted unemployment rate of 18.9 percent, upped slightly from 17.9 percent last year. Unemployment rate was about unchanged for those in the prime working age group (25-54 years old) at 6.7 percent and among the adults-55 years old and over (5.5%).

Male unemployment rate (9.3%) exceeded slightly their female counterparts (9.1%). On the other hand, urban unemployment rate edged up to 12.1 percent from 11.9 percent a year ago while rural unemployment rate was about unchanged at 6.7 percent.

UNDEREMPLOYMENT

Approximately one out of four employed persons were seeking additional hours of work (underemployed persons). Their number estimated at 6.269 million in January 1999 fell by 2.5 percent (-152,000) this year to 6.117 million. Accordingly, underemployment rate declined from 22.1 percent to 21.2 percent over the period under review.

Of total underemployed persons, a little more than one-half (55.1% or 3.370 million) were visibly underemployed (worked an average of less than 40 hours a week).

Underemployment is prevalent in the rural areas. Data indicate that nearly two-thirds (62.5% or 3.822 million) of underemployed persons worked in the rural areas. Likewise, majority (67.8%) of the visible underemployed persons were in the rural areas.
