THE 2000 EMPLOYMENT SITUATION

(The Year in Review)

Overview

The Philippine labor market experienced a downturn in 2000 after posting a moderate recovery in 1999. For the year under review, total employment dipped 1.0 percent pushing up unemployment rate to a record two-digit level (11.2%). The increase in unemployment rate could have been higher if not for a matching decline in labor force participation rate. Despite the slump in employment, it is noteworthy that wage and salary employment and full-time employment remained positive throughout most of the year. In addition, underemployment rate (21.7%) edged down slightly from last year (22.1%).

The figures cited in this report were derived as average of the four (4) rounds of the Labor Force Survey (LFS) conducted by the National Statistics Office during the months of January, April, July and October.

Labor Force Participation Rate (LFPR)

For the first time in many years, the average annual labor force participation rate posted a decline - from 66.4 percent in 1999

to 64.9 percent in 2000. The decrease in LFPR affects all age groups but were most pronounced among workers 55 years old and over (-1.7 percentage points) and the youth 15 to 24 years old (-1.8 percentage points). As of October 2000, the country's labor force was estimated at 30.908 million.

Employment

Following little change in January (+586,000), employment level in 2000 experienced two (2) consecutive rounds of large decline in April (-1.01 million) and (-747,000) before capping off with July near-zero growth in October (13,000). On annual basis, total employment contracted by a full one percentage point percent (-289,000) - a reversal from the 3.8 percent growth rate recorded in 1999. Over the period, total employed persons declined from 27.742 million to 27.453 million.

- Most of the decline in employment originated in agriculture, fishery and forestry sector which now accounts for only 37.1 percent of total employment. For 2000, employment in this sector fell by 5.5 percent which is a large departure from 1999 when the sector recovered strongly from the effects of the previous year drought by posting 6.3 percent growth rate.
- personal services (+2.9% or 158,000). As a reflection of the on-going political and economic crisis, employment in financing and business services contracted by 0.3 percent (-2,000) after expanding by 7.1 percent last year.
- The full effect of the economic instability was felt during October when the level of full-time employment and wage and

- □ For three (3) years in a row, growth in industry employment remained on a (-1.3%) as many companies continued to restructure themselves by laying off more workers. As in the past employment losses occurred mostly in construction (-2.6% or 40,000) followed by electricity, gas and water (-12.2% or 17,000) manufacturing (-0.5% or -14,000). In contrast, employment in mining and bounced quarrying back strongly (+10.5% or +11,000) after several years of sluggish performance.
- □ The service-producing industry provided the only source of employment growth this year. However, the size of growth has gone down to 2.9 percent (+365,000) which is the lowest growth figure since 1996. Among the subsectors, transportation, storage and communication grew the fastest (+4.2% or +80,000) followed by trade (+3.0 % or +131,000) and community, social and

- salary employment finally posted a decline (-635,000 and -285,000, respectively). This occurred despite their good showing in July when the number of full-time employment expanded by 937,000 and wage and salary employment grew 156,000.
- □ The slack in employment this year was accompanied by a large fall in part-time employment (-5.8% or -553,000) and employment of unpaid-family workers (-11.4% or -431,000). Own-account employment also recorded a slight decline (-0.2% or -22,000). These declines partly explain why the rate of underemployment dropped to 21.7 percent from 22.1 percent last year.
- □ Employment declines were felt in all regions except Regions I, VII, IX and ARMM. The most notable declines were recorded in Regions X (-3.0%), VI (-2.5%), XII (-2.8%), II (-2.2%), XI (-1.4%) and NCR (-2.0%).

UNEMPLOYMENT

Reflective of the weak labor market, the overall unemployment rate for 2000 topped the two-digit level. Average data from the four (4) survey rounds of the LFS revealed a full-year unemployment rate of 11.2 percent, upped from 9.8 percent last year. The rate could have been higher if this year's LFPR (64.9%) exceeded the rate that prevailed a year ago (66.4%). On a full year basis, the average number of unemployed persons in 2000 stood at 3.459 million, an increase of 442,000 from last year.

Unlike in the past years, two-digit unemployment rates were recorded in three out of the four rounds of the LFS. Of particular interest are the two-digit unemployment rates recorded during the months of July (11.2%) and October (10.1%) which were normally associated with single-digit rate.

There were eight (8) regions that posted two-digit unemployment rate, the highest were recorded in NCR (17.5%), Regions IV (12.0%), III (11.4%), VII (11.5%) and VI (11.1%).

- □ Female unemployment rate rose to 11.6 percent from 9.9 percent a year ago. Similarly, male unemployment rate increased from 9.5 percent to 10.8 percent.
- Young people aged 15 to 24 bore the brunt of the lower demand for jobs this year. Youth unemployment rate rose by a full 3.0 percentage points from last year increasing from 20.8 percent to 23.8 percent. On the other hand, unemployment rates for persons in prime working age 25 to 54 years and persons 55 years old and over posted less than one percentage point increase over the period.

UNDEREMPLOYMENT

The incidence of underemployment was placed at 21.7 percent, down 0.4 percentage point from last year. This corresponds to some 5.955 million underemployed persons.

Of the total underemployed persons, close to one-half or 3.040 million worked less than 40 hours a week or visibly underemployed. This number was slightly lower compared to the level recorded last year at 3.238 million.
