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HIGHLIGHTS OF THE OCTOBER 2001 LABOR FORCE SURVEY

Overview

The country's labor market held up better in October 2001 despite of the global economic slump as the unemployment rate eased to 9.8 percent from 10.1 percent recorded a year earlier. Employment level continued to grow at a respectable rate of 8.3 percent driven by the sustained growth in agriculture, forestry and fishery sector (8.2%) and the expansion in wholesale and retail trade sector (20.5%). The rate of underemployment also dipped to 16.6 percent from 19.9 percent a year ago.

The weakness in the labor market was, however, reflected by more workers accepting part-time work because they were unable to find full-time employment and the consequent rise (10.3%) in the number of visible underemployed persons.

Labor Force and Labor Force Participation Rate (LFPR)

More people joined the labor market in October as labor force participation rate (LFPR) hit a high of 67.5 percent, a full 3.2 percentage points increase from the same month last year. Overall, the country's labor force population swelled by 2.453 million to reach 33.361 million.

Employment

Employment level posted an 8.3 percent year-on-year growth in October, continuing the uptrend that began in the April round (7.2%) and July round (8.1%) of the Labor Force Survey. In absolute terms, total employed persons increased from 27.775 million to 30.090 million or an increment of 2.315 million over the period.

- Employment in the agriculture, fishery and forestry sector continued to expand growing by 8.2 percent (+851,000) in October. This figure is lower compared to the year-on-year growth rates registered in the April (10.9%) round and July round (11.4%).
- Industry sector employment rose by 5.3 percent (+237,000), upped from 1.3 percent decline registered in the same period last year. Employment in the construction sector bounced back from the decline (-3.1%) registered last year to post a 9.8 percent (+140,000) growth. On the other hand, growth in manufacturing employment was moderate at 3.5 percent (+99,000) while small declines were observed in mining quarrying (-1.9%).Meanwhile the Electricity, gas and water employment was unchanged.
- growth in service sector The employment accelerated to 9.5 percent from only 1.4 percent last year. The wholesale and retail trade sector, which grew by a robust 20.5 percent (+942,000), provided the largest source of growth even surpassing the gains achieved in agriculture, fishery and forestry sector. Notable employment gains were observed in financing, insurance, real estate and business **services** (25.1% or +170,000) and transportation, storage and communication (7.3% +147,000). The community, social and personal services was the only sub-sector which suffered a slump (-0.5 %).
- Part-time employment (worked less than 40 hours a week) increased by a hefty 20.5 percent (+1.929 million), virtually accounting for over four-fifths

- (83.3%) of all the growth in employment during this period. **Full-time employment** (worked 40 hours a week or more) remained sluggish at 1.1percent (+206,000).
- Employment increases in all classes of workers: Wage and salary employment rose 6.7% by (+945.000): own-account percent workers by 7.4 (+773,000)and unpaid family 17.8 percent workers by (+618,000).
- Employment growth was broadbased with all regions posting positive growth rates. Double-digit growth rates were recorded in four (4) regions, namely: NCR (10.6%), Region IV (10.1%) and Region XII (12.0%).

Unemployment

The national unemployment rate in October 2001 fell slightly to 9.8 percent from 10.1 percent a year earlier. Despite the decline, the number of unemployed persons edged up slightly from 3.133 million to 3.271 million over the period. This is due to the high labor force participation rate recorded in October mainly as a result of more people looking for employment.

- Unemployment rate declined for male workers (10.3% to 9.4%) but posted an increase among female workers (9.9% to 10.3%).
- Unemployment rate among the youth (15 to 24 years old) was down (21.1% to 19.0%). Meanwhile, the rates for the elderly persons 55 years old and over (5.8% to 5.9%) and for persons in the prime working age (7.1% to 7.2%) were of little change from last year.

- Unemployment rate recorded a decline in both urban areas (13.3% to 12.8%) and rural areas (7.1% to 6.9%).
- Across regional boundaries, only three (3) regions experienced a notable decline in unemployment rates, namely: NCR (17.8% to 16.5%), CAR (7.2% to 6.1%) and Region XII (8.6% to 6.9%). Unemployment rates in other regions recorded very sliaht changes from last year except for Region X which posted a full one percentage point increase (6.2% to 7.2%).

Underemployment

The incidence of underemployment went down from 19.9 percent a year ago to 16.6 percent in October. Correspondingly, the number of employed persons wanting more hours of worked fell from 5.528 million to 4.995 million.

 Nearly half (47.8%) of the underemployed were engaged agriculture, fishery and forestry sector. Relatively large proportions were also noted in wholesale and retail

- trade (13.0%) and community, social and personal services (13.6%).
- The majority (60.7%) of the underemployed were rural workers and the rest (39.3%) urban workers.
- By class of worker, one-half (50.2%) were wage and salarly workers and a little over onethird (38.0%) were ownaccount workers. The rest (11.8%) were unpaid family workers.

Visible underemployment

- About two-thirds (65.6%) of the total underemployed persons worked less than 40 hours a week or visibly underemployed, majority (65.5%) of the them rural workers.
- For the period under review, the number of visibly underemployed persons rose by 10.3 percent (+307,000), from 2.970 million to 3.277 million.
