

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FOREWORD

The interrelationship between population and development has always been an important consideration when charting programs to achieve a better quality of life. Programs for better health services, adequate nutrition, free education, housing for all and social welfare to the needy can only be planned properly if adequate and accurate data are available.

The results of the 1995 Census of Population, or POPCEN, provides updated data not only at the national level but more importantly at the local level. While the POPCEN was conducted mainly to provide an updated basis for the apportionment of the Internal Revenue Allocation (IRA) to the local government units in the country, it remains a useful data source to chart the future of a community effectively. The POPCEN may also be used as a gauge to evaluate if plans and programs are implemented objectively.

This report presents the population of the Philippines as of September 1, 1995. It provides data at both the provincial and municipality levels. It presents, among others, the distribution of the population by various sociodemographic characteristics as well as a profile of the disabled persons by type of disability and of the trade skill of the population.

This publication was made a reality by the more than 30,000 hired census field workers who toiled the sun and rain to count each and every individual in the country for the mid-decade census. We salute them for their dedication to this undertaking. Our deep appreciation also goes to our respondents from the northernmost island of Batanes to the southernmost island in Tawi-tawi and to the various entities and individuals, both government and non-government, who contributed their time and effort especially in the operations phase of the POPCEN. The successful conduct of the 1995 POPCEN is a proof that it is truly a "CeNSOng Pambayan, Sandigan ng Kaunlaran."

EXPLANATORY NOTE

1995 Census of Population

Introduction

In September 1995, the National Statistics Office conducted the 1995 Census of Population (POPCEN). This nationwide undertaking is the 10th population census conducted in the country.

Like the 1990 census, the 1995 POPCEN is designed to take an inventory of the total population in the Philippines and to about their information collect The data will provide an characteristics. updated basis for the apportionment of the Internal Revenue Allocation (IRA) to local government units and for the creation of new legislative areas such as regions, provinces, municipalities and barangays or the conversion of a municipality into a city. The census of population is the source of information on the size and distribution of the population as well as information about the demographic, social, economic and cultural characteristics. These information are vital for making rational plans and programs for development.

Pursuant to the provision of Batas Pambansa Blg. 72, a final report on the population count, and number of households at the barangay level was submitted to the President and declared official, for all purposes, under Proclamation No. 849 dated August 14, 1996.

Authority for Conducting the 1995 Census of Population

Under Commonwealth Act No. 591, the Bureau of the Census and Statistics (now

National Statistics Office) is authorized to prepare for and undertake all censuses of population, agriculture, industry and commerce.

Batas Pambansa Blg. 72, which was passed on June 11, 1980, further accorded the National Statistics Office the authority to conduct population censuses every ten years beginning in 1980 without prejudice to the undertaking of special censuses on agriculture, industry, commerce, housing and other sectors as may be approved by the National Economic and Development Authority (NEDA).

More recently, Executive Order No. 121, otherwise known as the Reorganization Act of the Philippine Statistical System, which was passed on January 30, 1987, declared that the NSO shall be the major statistical agency responsible for generating general purpose statistics and undertaking such censuses and surveys as may be designated by the National Statistical Coordination Board (NSCB).

On May 30, 1993, the NSCB approved the conduct of a mid-decade **NSCB** population census through Resolution 6-93. The 1995 POPCEN was under the overall supervision of the NSCB, which is chaired by the Director General of The NSCB membership the NEDA. consists of representatives (undersecretary level) of the various executive departments, including the Administrator of the NSO. With respect to the POPCEN, the NSO Administrator is the Executive Officer of the NSCB.

Census Coordinating Councils

For the 1995 POPCEN, the creation of Provincial Census Coordinating Councils (FCCC) and City/Municipal Census Coordinating Councils (C/MCCC) was authorized by NSCB Resolution No. 3, Series of 1995. The Provincial Statistics Officer (PSO) and District Statistics Officer (DSO) were responsible for organizing the PCCC and C/MCCC, respectively. These councils assisted the NSO field staff in the conduct of the POPCEN at the subnational level.

The Provincial Governor was the Chairman of the Provincial Census Coordinating Council (PCCC) with the Division Superintendent of the Department of Education, Culture and Sports (DECS) as Vice Chairman. The District Highway Engineer, the Provincial Commander of the Philippine Constabulary, the Provincial Planning & Development Officer, and three representatives from the private sector served as members. The Provincial Statistics Officer of the NSO acted as the Executive Officer of the PCCC.

The City/Municipal Census Coordinating Council (C/MCCC) was chaired by the City/Municipal Mayor as Chairman. The DECS Supervisor or Supervising Principal, Station Commander, Municipal Civil Registrar, Municipal Planning and Development Officer, and a representative from the private sector acted as members. The District Statistics Officer/Statistical Coordination Officer of the NSO served as Executive Officer of the C/MCCC.

Census Organization

The 1995 POPCEN was supervised and coordinated by the Household Statistics Department (HSD) under the direction and instructions of the Administrator. planning and preparatory activities for all aspects of the census was undertaken by the HSD in close coordination with the support divisions. Information Resources Division (IRD), Human Resources & Management Division (HRMD), Financial Services Division (FSD), and the Administrative Services Division (ASD). A Technical and Administrative Group (TAG), headed by the Chief of the HSD, oversaw the ten working groups created for this purpose.

The TAG was under the direction and supervision of a Steering Committee chaired by the Administrator and co-chaired by the Deputy Administrator. It was comprised of the HSD Chief and its division chiefs; Chiefs of the IRD, HRMD, FSD and ASD; Regional Administrator (RA) of NCR as field representative; and Chief of the Legal Section.

The HSD Chief is assisted by the Census Project Staff (CPS) in the coordination of working groups of the TAG and in the communication flow between Central Office (CO) units and the field offices. The CPS also served as Secretariat to the Steering Committee and as POPCEN monitoring, communications and action center. The Head of the CPS is an exofficio member of the TAG.

The RA acted as the regional census coordinator for his region, while the PSO

acted as the provincial census executive officer for his province.

POPCEN field During the operations, each NSO District Office within a province served as operations center under the direct supervision of the District Statistics Officer (DSO). For the POPCEN, the DSO was designated as the District Area Supervisor (DAS). In special cases, CO allowed a province to create sub-district offices for purposes of census supervision. The PSO assigned a regular field staff i.e., Statistical Coordination Officers the (SCOs)/ Assistant Statistical Coordination Officers (ASCOs) to run this sub-district office.

For the field enumeration, a group of census enumerators (ENs) was supervised by a team supervisor (TS) and a group of TS, by a Census Area Supervisor (CAS). NSO SCOs/ASCOs were designated as CAS. The DAS supervised all CAS, TS and ENs of the municipalities covered by the District or Subdistrict Office.

Method of Enumeration

The gathering of population data was performed by census enumerators through house-to-house visits and interview of a responsible member of each household. The household was used as the enumeration unit. However, a complete listing of buildings which contain living quarters, including vacant ones, as well as housing units was done.

The households were interviewed using the Household Questionnaire (CP Form 2). The items asked on population were household membership, relationship to head, whether or not a person was an overseas worker (OCW), date of birth, age as of last birthday, sex, civil status, disability, ethnicity, highest grade completed, trade skills and economic activity.

Institutional households were enumerated using the Institutional Population Questionnaire (CP Form 3). All items in CP Form 2 were also asked except for item OCW where residence status was asked instead.

Information about households of Filipinos working in the Philippine Embassies, Consulates and Missions in foreign countries, were also gathered and included in the total population of the country.

Place Where Enumerated

All persons were enumerated in their usual place of residence, which is the geographic place (street, barangay, sitio, municipality or province) where the enumerated person usually resides.

Filipinos working in Philippine Embassies/Consulates and Missions abroad were also enumerated. CP Form 2 questionnaires were sent to them through the Department of Foreign Affairs.

Content and Coverage of this Publication

POPCEN Report No. 2 contains sixteen (16) tables on the population characteristics. Figures on demographic (age, sex, civil status, disability, ethnicity and household size, education (highest grade completed), trade skills, economic characteristics (industry and class of worker) are based on the household population.

Aside from the Philippine volume, a separate report is published either for a province or highly-urbanized city. To facilitate access to these reports, an alphanumeric code, wherein the alphabetic code represents the region to which a province or highly-urbanized city belongs is provided.

Aside from the published tables, unpublished tables are available to users in computer print-outs or in diskettes (see Appendix C for the list of unpublished tables).

DEFINITION OF TERMS AND CONCEPTS

Barangay

A barangay is the smallest political unit in the country. Generally, its enumeration is assigned to one enumerator. For enumeration purposes, a large barangay is usually divided into parts and each part is called an enumeration area (EA).

For purposes of the 1995 POPCEN, the list of barangays, as of September 1,

1995, as prepared by the NSCB Technical Working Group on Geographic Classification, was used as basis for the geographic codes utilized. A total of 41,919 barangays were covered in this census.

Usual Place of Residence

This term refers to the geographic place (street, barangay, municipality, or province) where the enumerated person usually resides. As a rule, it is the place where he sleeps most of the time, hence, it may be the same as or different from the place where he was found at the time of the census.

Household

A household is a social unit consisting of a person living alone or group of persons who

- 1. sleep in the same housing unit; and
- 2. have a common arrangement in the preparation and consumption of food.

In most cases, a household consists of persons who are related by kinship ties, like parents and their children. In some instances, several generations of familial ties are represented in one household while, still in others, even distant relatives are members of the household.

Household helpers, boarders, and non-relatives are considered as members of

the household provided they sleep in the same housing unit and have common arrangement for the preparation and consumption of food and do not usually go home to their family at least once a week.

A group of unrelated individuals, as in the case of a group of students or workers, who decide to rent a place and make common arrangements for the preparation and consumption of their food constitutes one household.

Institutional Population

Institutional population comprises persons who are found living in institutional living quarters. They may have their own families or households elsewhere but at the time of the census they are committed or confined in institutions, or they live in institutional living quarters and are usually subject to a common authority or management, or are bound by either a common public objective or a common personal interest.

The following were considered as institutional living quarters:

- 1. Hotels, lodging houses, dormitories
- 2. Hospitals and nurses' homes
- 3. Welfare institutions
- 4. Corrective and penal institutions
- 5. Convents, nunneries, seminaries and boarding schools
- 6. Military camps and stations
- 7. Logging, mining and construction/public works camps

- 8. Ocean-going and inter-island/coastal vessels
- 9. Refugee camps

Persons Enumerated as Members of the Household

The following were counted and enumerated as members of the household:

- 1. Persons whose usual place of residence is the place where the household lives and who are present at the time of visit of the enumerator, except those born after 12:01 A.M., September 1, 1995.
- 2. Family members who are overseas and who are away at the time of the census are considered members of the household.
- 3. Persons whose usual place of residence is the place where the household lives but are temporarily away at the time of the census for any of the following reasons:
 - on vacation, business/pleasure trip or training somewhere in the Philippines and are expected to be back within six (6) months from time of departure;
 - on vacation, business/pleasure trip or study/training abroad and are expected to be back within a year from time of departure;

- working or attending school in some other place but comes home at least once a week;
- confined in hospitals for a period of not more than six (6) months at the time of enumeration except when they are confined as inmates in mental hospitals, leprosaria or leper colonies, drug rehabilitation centers, etc.;
- detained in national/provincial/ city/municipal jails or in military camps for a period of not more than six (6) months at the time of enumeration;
- training with the Armed Forces of the Philippines if training is not more than six (6) months;
- on board coastal, inter-island or fishing vessels within Philippine territories; or
- on board ocean-going vessels but are expected to come home.
- 4. Boarders/lodgers of the household or employees of household-operated businesses who do not usually go to their respective homes weekly.
- 5. Citizens of foreign countries, excluding members of diplomatic missions and non-Filipino members of international organizations, but including Filipino Balikbayans who have resided or are expected to reside in the Philippines for more than a year from his arrival.

6. Persons temporarily staying with the household who have no usual place of residence or who are not certain to be enumerated elsewhere.

Persons Enumerated as Members of the Institutional Population

The following persons were enumerated as members of the institutional population:

- 1. Permanent lodgers in boarding houses
- 2. Dormitory residents who do not go home at least once a week
- 3. Hotel residents who have stayed more than 6 months at the time of the census
- 4. Boarders in residential houses, provided that their number is ten (10) or more.
- 5. Patients in hospitals who are confined for more than 6 months
- 6. Wards in orphanages
- 7. Inmates of penal colonies or prison cells
- 8. Priest and seminarians in seminaries, nuns in convents
- 9. Soldiers residing in military camps
- 10. Workers in mining and similar camps

The following persons were excluded as members of the institutional

population but were included in the households to which they belong:

- 1. Military officials and members of their households who have housing units within military camps.
- 2. Managers (and members of their households) of refugee camps, dormitories, hotels, hospitals, etc., who occupy and regularly use as their place of abode living quarters in the institutions that they manage.
- 3. Priests who, together with their relatives and/or household help, occupy and regularly use as their place of abode a living quarter in the church or seminary.

Fersons Excluded from the Enumeration

The following persons were excluded from enumeration even if they were within the territorial jurisdiction of the Philippines at the time of the POPCEN enumeration:

- 1. Foreign ambassadors, ministers, consuls or other diplomatic representatives, and members of their families (except Filipino and non-Filipino employees who have been residents of the Philippines prior to said employment);
- 2. Citizens of foreign countries living within the premises of an embassy, legation, chancellery or consulate;

- 3. Citizens of foreign countries who are chiefs or officials of international organizations like United Nations (UN), International Labor Organizations (ILO), Asian Development Bank (ADB), Food and Agricultural Organization (FAO), the US Agency for International Development (USAID) who are subject to reassignment to other countries after their tour of duty in the Philippines, and members of their families;
- 4. Citizens of foreign countries together with non-Filipino members of their households, who are students or who are employed, or have business in the Philippines but who are expected to stay in the country for less than a year from arrival;
- 5. Citizens of foreign countries and Filipinos with usual place of residence in a foreign country who are visiting the Philippines and who have stayed or are expected to stay in the country for less than a year from arrival;
- 6. Citizens of foreign countries in refugee camps/vessels; and
- 7. Residents of the Philippines on vacation, pleasure or business trip, study or training, etc., abroad who have been away from the Philippines for more than a year from departure.

Persons working for them or living with them were also enumerated based on the rules of enumeration.

Respondent

A respondent is any responsible adult member of the household who furnished the information or answers to questions during the interview/enumeration.

Head of Household

The person responsible for the care and organization of the household is generally considered as the *head of household*. He/She usually provides the chief source of income for the household.

In the case of a household consisting of two or more unrelated persons sharing the same cooking facilities and means, the head is usually the eldest male or female in the group regarded as such by the other members.

Relationship to the Household Head

Data on the relationship to the head of household provides an indication of the typical relationship among household members. Each member of the household has a specific relationship to the head by virtue of his presence in the household. Such relationship may or may not be based on kinship. The members of the household are classified as follows:

Spouse of the Head - a man/woman married to and living with the head. It includes legal marriages as well as consensual relationships.

- Son/Daughter children of the head regardless of age or marital status.
- Stepson/Stepdaughter a spouse's child in a previous marriage.
- Son-in-law/Daughter-in-law the husband or wife of the son or daughter of the head.
- Grandson/Granddaughter child of the son or daughter of the head.
- Father/Mother refers to the parents of the head.
- Brother/Sister refers to the head's own brother or sister.
- Uncle/Aunt a brother, sister or cousin of the head/ spouse's parents.
- Nephew/Niece the child of the brother, sister or cousin of the head.
- Other Relative include such relatives as parents-in-law, cousins, grand-parents, sisters/brothers-in-law, etc.
- Non-Relative any person in the household who is not related to the head.
- Boarder members of the household who are related to the head by blood or affinity but who are boarders.
- Domestic Helper members of the household who are related to the head by blood or affinity but who are household helpers.

Overseas Workers

An overseas worker is a household member who is currently out of the country due to overseas employment. He or she may or may not have a specific work contract or may be presently at home on vacation but has an existing overseas employment to return to. "TNT" workers are included if the household still considers them as members and if they mention their names when you ask about the names of household members. However, immigrants are excluded.

Age and Date of Birth

Data on the age of the population were obtained by asking the month and year of birth and the age itself of an individual before September 1, 1995.

Birth Registration

This was asked to know whether the birth of an individual was registered with the Local Civil Registrar (LCR).

Civil Status

This refers to the personal status of each individual in reference to the marriage laws or customs of the country. This was asked to all persons 10 years old and over as of the date of visit. A person in this age group is classified as single, legally married, widowed, separated/ divorced, commonlaw/live-in or civil status unknown, based on the following definitions:

Single - a person who has never been married.

Legally Married - a person married in a civil or religious ceremony, either living together with spouse at the time of the POPCEN visit or temporarily living apart because the spouse is employed elsewhere or is in the armed forces, etc.

Widowed - a married person whose spouse has died and who has not remarried up to the time of the POPCEN visit.

Separated/Divorced - a person who is permanently separated from his/her spouse, legally, or whose marriage has been annulled or dissolved and can remarry.

Common-law/Live-in - person cohabiting or living consensually with another as husband and wife without the benefit of a legal marriage.

Unknown - person whose civil status is unknown to the respondent.

Disability

Disability refers to any restriction or lack of ability (resulting from an impairment) to perform an activity in the manner or within the range considered normal for a human being. Impairments associated with disabilities may be physical, mental or sensory motor impairment such as partial or total blindness and deafness,

- muteness, speech defect, orthopedic handicaps, and mental retardation. Disability is classified as follows:
 - Total Blindness a person with total lack of vision of both eyes.
 - Partial Blindness a person with no vision in one eye whether with or without an eyeball but low vision in the other eye.
 - Low Vision a person who can see form or movement but not details of objects (color, surface, lines).
 - Total Deafness a person with total deafness.
 - Partial Deafness a person with one ear totally deaf while the other ear can still react or recognize sounds.
 - Poor Hearing Ability a person whose both ears can recognize sounds but cannot determine the words.
 - Muteness a person who cannot talk (e.g. mute - this is because of lack of training on speech development or caused by accident or sickness that damage the vocal cord or tongue).
 - Speech Defect a person who can say words but stammers (includes cleft-palate and hare-lip with speech defect).
 - Loss of One or Both Arms/Hands a person without one or both arms/hands either acquired from

- birth or amputated as a result of accident or sickness.
- Loss of One or Both Legs/Feet a person with one or both legs or feet missing, either congenital or amputated as a result of accident or sickness.
- Paralysis of One or Both Arms a person who cannot use his/her arms and hands either one or both (e.g. stroke victim) and the paralysis is permanent.
- Paralysis of One or Both Legs a person who cannot move either one or both feet and the paralysis is permanent.
- Paralysis of One Arm and One Leg
- Paralysis of All Four Limbs a person who is a quadriplegic.
- Mental Retardation a person who can learn simple communication, elementary health and safety habit and simple manual skills, but does not progress in functional reading or arithmetic.
- Mental Illness a person who is suffering from nervous breakdown/mental illness or one who is insane.
- Others refers to disabilities other than the above, including multiple disability and other combination of other arm/leg impairment/paralysis.

Explanatory Note

Ethnicity

In the POPCEN, ethnicity of an individual is synonymous to the mother tongue or the language/dialect spoken at home at earliest childhood. Data were obtained only for Filipino citizens. Filipinos who have acquired foreign citizenship were considered foreign nationals and their ethnicity were not recorded.

Highest Grade Completed

Highest grade completed refers to the highest grade or year completed in school, college or university as of September 1, 1995. Data on highest grade completed furnish material for a comparison of the present educational levels of the adult population with the present and anticipated future requirements of manpower for various types of economic activities.

A person's highest grade completed is categorized as:

None - did not undergo formal schooling

Elementary - grade 1 to grade 7

High School - 1st year to 4th year

High School Graduate

Postsecondary - 1 to 2 years

College Undergraduate - 1st year to 6th

year

College Graduate

Post- baccalaureate - refers to any course for which an undergraduate degree is required. Masters and doctoral degree students and graduates fall under this category.

Trade Skill

Trade skill refers to technical/vocational ability or knowledge developed or acquired which will enable an individual to generate income to meet at least their basic needs (e.g., at least food needs).

and practiced ability to competently carry out a task or job, usually of a manual in nature, in any industrial craft or artisan occupation which is officially and traditionally recognized as requiring special qualifications which can only be acquired through lengthy experience, and practical or theoretical instructions. In the POPCEN, trade skills include vocational skills, agriculture skills, technical skills, food trades and fishery art.

Economic Activity

One of the major objectives of the POPCEN is to gather information that can serve as a basis for constructing a statistical frame for the conduct of data collection activities regarding the informal sector. Towards this end, data on economic activity by industry classification and class of worker were obtained.

Economic activity refers to the production of goods and provision of services primarily to generate income or as a means of livelihood. A person is said to be economically active if he/she is engaged in the following:

- Production of goods and services normally intended for sale on the market at a price that is designated to cover their cost of production;
- 2. Production of goods and services which are not normally sold at a price intended to cover their cost of production such as government service, private non-profit services to households, domestic services rendered by one household to another; and
- 3. Types of production for own consumption and fixed capital formation for own use including:
 - production of primary products (from agriculture, forestry, fishing, mining and quarrying) for own consumption
 - processing of primary commodities by their producers to make goods for their own use
 - production for own consumption provided they are also produced for the market
 - own-account construction of works and fabrication of tools dwelling units, buildings, and similar, instruments, containers which have an expected life of use of at least one year (fixed assets)

A person who works for pay either in cash or in kind, for pay or profit in own business, farm or enterprise or without pay on own family farm or business is said to be economically active. For the POPCEN, he/she is said to be engaged in an economic activity if he/she worked for at least one hour in any week in the past twelve months.

Class of Worker

An individual engaged in an economic activity can be classified according to employer-employee relationships or for whom or where he/she works, as follows:

- 1. Worked for private household (domestic services) a person who works in a private household for pay in cash or in kind.
- 2. Worked for private business/enterprise/farm - a person who works in a private business/enterprise/farm for pay, in cash or in kind. This class includes not only persons working for a private firm but also those working for a religious group, missionary, unions, and non-profit organizations.
- 3. Worked for government/government corporation a person who works for the government or a government corporation or any of its instrumentalities.
- 4. Self-employed without any paid employee a person who works for

profit or fees in own business, farm, profession or trade without any paid employee. This includes workers who work purely on commission basis and who may not have regular working hours.


- 5. Employer in own farm or business a person working in his own business, farm, profession or trade has one or more regular paid employees, including paid family members. Domestic helpers, family drivers and other household helpers who assist in the family operated business, regardless of time spent in NOT this activity, are hired employees in the enterprise/business; hence a farm or business proprietor who is assisted purely by such domestic help is not considered an employer and would be classified in category 4 above.
- 6. Worked with pay on own family-operated farm or business a person who works in family-operated farm or business and receives cash or a fixed share of the produce as payments for his service.

7. Worked without any pay on own family operated farm or business - a member of the family who works without pay in a farm or business operated by another member living in the same household. The room and board and any cash allowance given as incentives are not counted as compensation for these family workers.

Industry

Industry refers to the nature or character of the business or enterprise or the place wherein the person works.

The industry classifications utilized in the POPCEN are consistent with those defined in the *Philippine Standard Classification of all Economic Activities* (PSIC). Examples of industries are palay farming, poultry raising, metallic ore mining, food and beverage manufacturing, wholesale and retail trade, government services, and domestic services.




BAGUIO CITY

Highlights of the 1995 Census of Population

Population Size and Growth

• The total population of Baguio City, as of September 1, 1995, was 226,883 persons. This implies an increase of 43,741 persons, or about 23.9 percent, over the 1990 census count of 183,142.



- During the 1990-1995 intercensal period, the population of Baguio City grew at the rate of 4.1 percent annually. This is 0.3 percentage point lower than the annual growth rate during the eighties (4.4 percent).
- If the average annual growth rate continues at 4.1 percent, the population of Baguio City is expected to double in about 17 years. It will increase, on the average, by almost nine thousand persons a year, or about one person per hour.

Population Distribution


Baguio City had a total of 131 barangays in 1995. Barangay Irisan registered the largest population with 11,971 persons. It accounted for 3.8 percent of the population of the entire city. Fairview Village followed with 5.682 persons, or 1.8 percent of the population of the city. Gibraltar registered the third largest population with 5,296 persons, or 1.7 percent of the population of the city. Malcolm Square-Perfecto (Jose Abad Santos) registered the lowest population with 64 persons, or 0.03 percent of the population of the city.

Age-Sex Composition

- The males numbered 111,185, as of September 1, 1995, or 4,513 persons less than the female population of 115,698.
- There was a marked change in the sex ratio from 1990 to 1995. The 1995 census indicated a sex ratio of 96.1 males per 100 females. In the 1990 census, this was 104.7.
- Baguio City had a young population. Almost one-third (32.8 percent) were under 15 years of age. However, there was an unusually large proportion of the population in the ages 15 to 24 years. This may be attributed to inmigration of the college-age popula-

tion as Baguio City is home of eight of the 27 colleges/universities in the Cordillera Administrative Region.

- More than three-fifths (64.6 percent) of the total population in 1995 were in the productive age group (15-64 years of age), while only 2.5 percent were at least 65 years of age.
- In 1995, the population of Baguio City had a median age of 21.4 years.
 The median age for females (21.5 years) was about the same as for males (21.2 years).



• The dependency ratio of Baguio City was 55 percent in 1995. This means that for every 100 persons in the working ages (15 to 64 years old), there were about 55 dependents, that


is, 51 persons under 15 years of age and about four persons 65 years old and over.

Marital Status

- The proportion of those in the common-law or live-in relationship increased, from 0.1 percent in 1990 to 0.8 percent in 1995.
- * The proportion single was slightly higher among males (49.9 percent) than among females (48.5 percent). The proportion widowed was noticeably higher among females (4.9 percent) than among males (1.2 percent).

Highest Grade Completed

The largest percentage (30.9 percent) of the population 7 years old and over reached or completed high school education. This proportion was slightly higher than in 1990 (29.4 percent).



- The proportion who had no grade completed decreased, from 2.0 percent in 1990 to 1.4 percent in 1995. The proportion who attended or completed pre-school increased, from 0.8 percent in 1990 to 1.2 percent in 1995.
- The proportion who were degree holders increased, from 17.1 percent in 1990 to 19.9 percent in 1995.
- The proportion who were academic degree-holders was higher among females (20.6 percent) than among males (17.5 percent). On the other hand, the proportion who attended or completed elementary education only was higher for males (25.0 percent) than for females (23.4 percent).

Mother Tongue

 Half of the total household population spoke Ilocano during early childhood. About one-fifth (22.7 percent) spoke Tagalog. The remaining 27.3 percent spoke Kankanai (9.1 percent), Pangasinan (4.0 percent), Ibaloi (3.4 percent) and other dialects (10.7 percent).

Type of Disability

• There were about 1,782 persons in the city, or about 0.8 percent of the total population, who were reported to have some type of disability.


- The sex ratio of the population with some type of disability was 110 males per 100 females.
- Low vision was the most common type of disability in 1995 accounting for 21.4 percent of all persons with disability. The percentage with low vision was higher among the female population (26.3 percent) than among the male population (16.9 percent).
- Paralysis of one or both legs was the second most common type of disability (10.0 percent), followed by mental retardation (8.3 percent), and partial deafness (8.2 percent).

Number and Size of Households

- The number of households in the city rose to 48,071 households in 1995, or an increase of 31.5 percent over the 1990 census figure of 36,547 households.
- The average household size in 1995
 was 4.6 persons. In 1990, this was
 4.9 persons. The decrease in average
 household size implies that for every
 100 households, the reported number
 of members decreased by 30 persons.

Characteristics of Household Heads

 Majority of households in Baguio City were male-headed (81.2 percent).
 Female-headed households accounted for only 18.8 percent of the total number of households. Females were more likely to head smaller households while males, larger ones. Male-headed households had an average household size of 4.9 persons, while female-headed households, 3.6 persons.



- Male household heads tended to be relatively younger than their female counterparts. The percentage who were aged 20-49 years was higher among male heads (77.1 percent) than among female heads (57.6 percent).
- By comparison, the percentage who were aged 50 years and over was higher among female heads (32.9 percent) than among male heads (21.0 percent).

Overseas Workers

• The number of overseas workers in the city more than doubled in five years, from 2,242 in 1990 to 5,085 in 1995. The overseas workers in 1995 was about 2.3 percent of the total household population as compared to 1.2 percent in 1990.

- The majority of overseas workers were in the ages 25 to 39 years (58.0 percent).
- More than half (52.9 percent) of the overseas workers were females.
- More than two-fifths (43.4 percent) of the overseas workers were academic degree holders, while about onefourth (25.2 percent) reached or completed high school.


Trade Skill

- Among the 148,245 persons 15 years old and over, only 19,368 persons or 13.1 percent had some trade skills. Almost half of them had skills in driving and mobile machinery (19.1 percent), other crafts and related trades (15.5 percent), or mining, construction and related trades (13.6 percent).
- The majority (63.5 percent) of the population 15 years old and over who had some skills were males.
- More than half (57.1 percent) of persons 15 years old over with trade skills had acquired their skills through experience/apprenticeship. This is true for all of the major trade skills categories, except for metal, machinery and related trades.
- The proportion who acquired trade skills through experience/ apprenticeship was higher among males (62.2 percent) than among

females (48.3 percent). In contrast, the proportion who acquired trade skills through schooling was higher among females than among males (35.9 percent against 28.2 percent).

Industry


- About six out of ten persons 15 years old and over who worked at anytime in the past year were engaged in services (60.7 percent).
- Those engaged in trade made up 14.5 percent, while those engaged in construction, 10.4 percent, manufacturing, 8.4 percent and agriculture, hunting and forestry, 3.6 percent.



Class of Worker

• Almost half (48.4 percent) of the population 15 years old and over who

worked at anytime in the past year worked for private business/ enterprise/farm. The proportion of those self-employed without any paid employee accounted for 19.0 percent.



- The proportion who worked for private households (domestic services) was higher for females than for males (19.4 percent against 4.1 percent). Likewise, the proportion of females (6.3 percent) who worked without pay in own family-operated farm or business was higher than that for males (1.5 percent).
- The proportion of those who worked for private business/enteprise/farm was higher among males (56.4 percent) than among females (37.6 percent).

APPENDICES

BATAS PAMBANSA BLG. 72

PROVIDING FOR THE TAKING OF AN INTEGRATED CENSUS EVERY TEN YEARS BEGINNING IN THE YEAR NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

SECTION 1. A national census of population and other related data shall be taken every decade beginning in 1980, in accordance with plans prepared by the National Census and Statistics Office, without prejudice to the undertaking of special censuses on agriculture, industry, commerce, housing and other sectors as may be approved by the National Economic and Development Authority.

SECTION 2. There is hereby created the National Census Coordinating Board to be composed of the Minister of Economic Planning, as Chairman, the Minister of Human Settlements, the Minister of the Budget, the Minister of the Justice, the Minister of National Defense, the Minister of Labor, the Minister of Finance, the Minister of Education and Culture, the Minister of Public Works, the Minister of Transportation and Communications, the Minister of Public Highways, the Minister of Agriculture, the Minister of Natural Resources, the Minister of Public Information, and the Minister of Local Government and Community Development, as members, with the Executive Director of the National Census and Statistics Office as Executive Officer of the Board.

The census shall be under the supervision and coordination of the National Census Coordinating Board which shall issue such rules and regulations as maybe be necessary for the successful undertaking and completion of the censuses provided in this Act.

SECTION 3. There shall be established a provincial, city and municipal census board in each province, city and municipality, as the case may be, which shall provide such facilities and assistance as may be required by the National Census Coordinating Board. The boards shall be under the supervision and control of the National Census Coordinating Board.

SECTION 4. The Provincial Census Board shall be composed of the Provincial Governor, as Chairman, and the Division Superintendent of Schools, or in the case of provinces with more than one school division, the Division Superintendent designated by the National Census Coordinating Board, as Vice Chairman, the District Highway Engineer, or in the case of provinces which have two or more highway engineering districts, the one that may be designated by the National Census Coordinating Board, the Provincial Commander of the Philippine Constabulary, the Provincial Development Officer, the Provincial Assessor, and the Provincial Agriculturist, as members, with the Provincial Census Officer as the Executive Officer.

The City Census Board shall be composed of the Municipal mayor, as Chairman, and the District Supervisor, the Municipal Agriculturist, the Station Commander, the Municipal Treasurer, and the Municipal Development Officer, as members, with the Municipal Census Officer/Census Supervisor as the Executive Officer.

The Municipal Census Board shall be composed of the Municipal Mayor, as Chairman, and the District Supervisor, the Municipal Agriculturist, the Station Commander, the Municipal Treasurer, and the Municipal Development Officer, as members, with the Municipal Census Officer/Census Supervisor as the Executive Officer.

APPENDIX A

- SECTION 5. The National Census Coordinating Board and the local census boards may call upon any ministry, bureau, office, agency or instrumentality of the Government for any assistance in the performance of their duties.
- SECTION 6. The first day of May of every regular census year is hereby designated as the reference date for the census. The collection of data will be by enumeration and the respondent shall be the head or any responsible member of the household.
- SECTION 7. Public school teachers shall be employed for enumeration work and for such services shall be paid an honorarium as may be determined by the National Census Coordinating Board but in no case not less than two hundred-fifty pesos and shall receive service credits equivalent to the number of days rendered in census work. Other government employees whose services are engaged for census work shall be entitled to such allowances as shall be prescribed by the National Census Coordinating Board payable from census funds. The census herein taken at the barangay level shall be certified to by the corresponding barangay captain.
- SECTION 8. Before the end of the year 1980 and of every census thereafter, a count of the population by province, city, municipality and barangay shall be published by the National Census of Statistics Office. The final population count as determined from the processed census returns shall be considered official for all purposes upon proclamation by the President (Prime Minister).
- SECTION 9. Data gathered pursuant to this Act shall not be used as evidence in any court or public office for or against any person, except in a criminal case for violation of Section 10 of this Act, nor shall such data be divulged to any person except to authorized employees of the National Census and Statistics Office, acting in the performance of their duties; nor shall such data be published except in the form of summaries or statistical tables in which no reference to an individual shall appear. Any person violating any provision of this Section shall be punished by a fine of not more than five hundred pesos or by imprisonment of not more than six months, or both.
- SECTION 10. Any respondent as provided for in Section 6 who unjustifiably refuses to furnish the information called for in the sus questionnaire, or knowingly certifies or gives data or information which shall prove to be materially untrue in any particular, shall be guilty of an offense under this Act and shall, upon conviction, be punished by a fine of not more than five hundred pesos or by imprisonment of not more than three months, or both.
- SECTION 11. The amount necessary for the holding of censuses shall be charged to the appropriations available for the purpose in the corresponding Appropriations Acts.

SECTION 12. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
